Aristotle defined rhetoric as "an ability, in each particular case, to see the available means of persuasion" (Aristotle Rhetoric I.1.2, Kennedy 37). Since then, Aristotle's definition of rhetoric has been reduced in many situations to mean simply "persuasion."

In rhetoric, any factors that restrict the persuasive strategies or opportunities available to a speaker or writer are called constraints.In "The Rhetorical Situation," Lloyd Bitzer notes that rhetorical constraints are "made up of persons, events, objects, and relations which are part of the [rhetorical] situation because they have the power to constrain decision or action."
